About CAUSA

The Connecticut Association for United Spanish Action, Inc. (CAUSA) was formed in 1975 to respond to social services needs of Latinos in Connecticut and to better assist and support social service Latino agencies. The first non-profit umbrella agency for Latinos in the state, CAUSA has undergone many changes in the past 30 years but, despite many challenges, has been able to maintain continuous services to its member agencies throughout its history. CAUSA estimates that approximately 200,000 people have benefited directly from its leadership in the fields of human services, education, training, healthcare and technical assistance in the past three decades. CAUSA is headquartered in Hartford, CT.

The Problem: The Growing Diabetes Epidemic within the Connecticut Latino Community

The growing diabetes epidemic is both alarming and tragic. In the United States the statistics are shocking: the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently announced that from 1990 to 2000 the number of Americans diagnosed with diabetes has escalated from 4.9% to 7.3% of the population, a 49% increase.

Today the American Diabetes Association (ADA) and the National Institutes of Health estimate that 16 million Americans have diabetes (25% of these undiagnosed), with approximately 1 million Type 1 and 10.3 million Type 2 diabetics diagnosed.
